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1	PREAMBLE
2 3	Employees organize primarily to secure better wages and better working conditions.
4 5 6 7	We hold that they also organize in order to participate in the decisions which affect them at work. One of the fundamental tenets of Democratic government is the consent of the governed.
, 8 9	We are both employees and citizens.
10 11 12 13	Collective bargaining is the expression of citizenship in employment. Participation in the political life of the nation, state, local municipalities, and school district is but another aspect of that citizenship.
14 15 16	In the same way that we are organized to improve the terms and conditions of employment, we are equally dedicated to exert ourselves, individually and collectively, to fulfill the promise of American life. Amidst unparalleled abundance, there should not be want.
17 18 19 20	We are under a solemn obligation to represent the members of this organization forcefully and effectively in negotiations with the management of the Centralia School District and to conduct internal organizational affairs according to democratic standards.
21 22 23 24 25	THEREFORE, we, the classified school employees of Centralia School District, in meeting, adopt these bylaws this 18 th day of June 1975.
26 27 28	ARTICLE I NAME
29 30 31 32	The name of this organization shall be the Public School Employees of Centralia School District.
33 34 35	ARTICLE II AFFILIATION
36 37 38 39 40 41	This local organization shall be affiliated with and be a chapter of the Public School Employees of Washington / SEIU Local 1948, a not-for-profit 501 (c) 5 labor organization operating under the laws of the State of Washington. Public School Employees of Washington / SEIU Local 1948 chartered this organization on June 18, 1975.
42 43 44	ARTICLE III
45 46 47	CONTINUATION OF ORGANIZATION This organization shall continue until a majority of all of the members vote to dissolve the

	ARTICLE IV OBJECTIVES AND PURPOSES
The ob	jectives and purposes of this organization are:
	To carry out and assist on a local basis the objectives and purposes of the Public School Employees of Washington.
В.	To promote the organization of Public School Employees in the Centralia School District.
C.	To promote the welfare of the membership and the classified employees of the Centralia School District, and to provide a voice in the determination of the terms and conditions of employment. We are committed to the process of collective bargaining as a desirable, democratic and effective method to achieve this.
D.	To promote and provide systematic and effective employee management through collective bargaining; to confer and negotiate in good faith, with respect to grievance procedures and collective negotiations on personnel matters, including wages, hours and working conditions, vacations, holidays and other conditions of employment for the classified employees of Centralia School District.
E.	Both as members and as citizens, we shall also employ available legislative and political action to establish adequate financial provisions for the improvement of public school education and equitable consideration for the classified school employees from the state legislators.
F.	To establish better fellowship and understanding among classified school employees and to strive for their overall betterment through training, legislation and association benefits.
	ARTICLE V
	MEMBERSHIP
Except nationa	1. Eligibility. as otherwise provided in these bylaws, any person without regard to race, creed, color, al origin, sex, or political belief, who meets the requirements hereinafter listed shall be e for membership.

Active Member.</u> resons regularly employed as a classified school employee (as defined by the Public School yees of Washington / SEIU Local 1948) by or in Centralia School District, and who are ers of the Public School Employees of Washington / SEIU Local 1948, are eligible for ership in the organization.
Section To be a	3. Member in Good Standing. eligible to participate in any chapter business, a member must be in good standing and not a

⁴⁸ "free-rider". Any member who opts out of payment of regular dues shall be characterized as a



¹ "free-rider" and shall be entitled only to those rights and privileges as set forth in PSE policy and

state and/or local bylaws. A "free-rider" shall not be entitled to hold any local or state office, serve on any chapter or state committee, attend local or state meetings, vote for local and state leaders, or vote for ratification of collective bargaining agreements. In addition, a "free-rider" may not attend any PSE sponsored function. To be in good standing, the member shall be employed and current in payment of dues as required by these bylaws. Any member who is on authorized leave of absence pursuant to the collective bargaining agreement shall retain the right to vote and hold office. Any member who is terminated from employment shall not be eligible to vote or hold office.

11 Section 4. Dues.

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12	А.	Application for membership shall be made on a standard application form provided by the
13		Executive Board.

- B. Chapter dues of this organization shall be one dollar (\$1.00) per month.
- C. Chapter dues shall be payable monthly to the Secretary-Treasurer of the chapter.
 - D. When a member is unemployed for more than twenty (20) days in any calendar month and does not receive unemployment compensation or sick pay or other remuneration, they may be entitled to credit for dues for the period of unemployment, not to exceed six (6) months in any calendar year.
 - E. Membership dues are not refundable except where an error resulting in an overpayment exists.
 - F. State dues shall be as outlined in state bylaws.
 - G. The organization in accordance with the provisions of the state bylaws shall receive dues rebates from the state organization in the amount of six percent (6%) for the purpose of sending delegates to the state convention and/or legislative conference.

33 Section 5. Rights.

- A. PSE shall be governed by a representative form of government.
- B. Members in good standing shall suffer no impairment of freedom of speech concerning the
 operations of this organization. Active discussions of organization affairs shall be
 encouraged and protected within this organization.
- C. Members in good standing shall have the right to fair and democratic elections at all levels
 of the organization. This includes due notice of nominations and elections, equal
 opportunities for competing candidates, and proper election procedures which shall be
 specifically set forth
- D. Members in good standing shall have an equal right to run and hold office, except those persons set forth in RCW 41.56.030; and those employees classified either by state statute or appropriate state regulatory agencies as being a "supervisory employee".



- E. Members in good standing shall have the right to a full and clear accounting of all organizational funds. At all levels such accounting shall include, but not be limited to,
 - periodic reports to the membership by appropriate fiscal officers connected with the organization, and a financial audit at least once a year which is made available to all members.
 - F. Members in good standing shall have the right to full participation, through discussion and vote, in the decision-making processes of the organization and to pertinent information needed for the exercises of this right.

ARTICLE VI MEETINGS

16 Section 1.

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General membership meetings of this organization shall be held at least three (3) times annually at a time and place to be fixed by the membership or the Executive Board.

1920 Section 2.

Special meetings may be called by the President, the Executive Board, or by the petition filed with the President and signed by twenty percent (20%) of the members of this organization.

24 Section 3.

The President shall provide at least five (5) days notification to all members in good standing of any meeting called. However, the Executive Board may waive said five (5) days' notice provided that every reasonable effort is employed to notify the membership of the meeting.

29 <u>Section 4.</u>

At any meeting of the membership of this organization, each member in good standing present shall be entitled to one (1) vote. A member in good standing must be present to vote - no proxy vote will be allowed. A minimum of seven (7) members in good standing must be present to constitute a quorum before any organization business may be transacted.

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ARTICLE VII MANAGEMENT

3940 Section 1.

The business and property of this organization shall be managed by the Executive Board, except when the meetings of the organization are in session. All matters affecting the purposes, aims and means of accomplishing the purposes of this organization, not specifically provided for in these bylaws or by action of the members in good standing at a regular or special meeting shall be

The Executive Board shall be composed of the President or Co-Presidents, Vice President,

Other units requesting further affiliation 10 11 Section 3. 12 The term of office of the Executive Board and trustees of this organization shall be for a period of 13 two (2) years. 14 15 Section 4. 16 The Executive Board shall hold regular meetings prior to each chapter meeting, and such special 17 meetings as the President(s) or the Board shall deem necessary for the competent management of 18 affairs of the organization. 19 20 Section 5. 21 Each member of the Executive Board shall possess one (1) vote in matters coming before the 22 Board. All voting at meetings of the Executive Board shall be by each member present in person, 23 and voting by proxy shall not be allowed. A majority of the members of the Executive Board shall 24 constitute a quorum. 25 26 Section 6. 27 Any member of the Executive Board may be removed from office by a two-thirds (2/3) majority 28 vote of the membership at any regular or special meeting of the membership of the organization. 29 Notice of the proposed removal of the board member must be given to the board member five (5) 30 days prior to the date of the meeting at which the removal is to be voted upon. Such notice to the 31 board member must state the cause for the proposed removal. 32 33 Section 7. 34 Unexcused absences from three (3) consecutive Executive Board meetings shall be due cause for 35 removal of the board member by the Executive Board. Removal of a board member because of 36 excessive absenteeism shall not require the two/thirds (2/3) vote of membership. 37 38 Section 8. 39 Any vacancies occurring on the Executive Board (except President) by reason of death, resignation 40 or removal, the remaining board members may appoint a temporary replacement from the 41 membership at large who will serve during the unexpired term of the board member whose position 42 has become vacant. 43 44 Trustee vacancies shall be filled by a member in good standing from their classification. 45 46 47 48 49

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ARTICLE VIII OFFICERS, NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS

5 Section 1.

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14 15 The Officers of this organization shall be President or Co-Presidents, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, Membership Officer, Sergeant-at-Arms and Trustees. Every even-numbered year, the President, Secretary, Membership Officer, Transportation Trustee and Bus Monitor Trustee shall be elected for a term of two (2) years. Every odd-numbered year, the Vice President, Treasurer, Sergeantat-Arms, Food Service Trustee and Shop Trustee shall be elected for a term of two (2) years. Election of officers shall be held in the spring each year with new officers beginning their term September 1 of that year. Co-Presidents may be elected at the discretion of the Executive Board. If the Executive Board decides to have Co-Presidents, one (1) will be elected from food service every odd-numbered year and one (1) from transportation every even-numbered year.

16 Section 2.

17 Nominations may be made by the Nominating Committee, but whether or not such Nominating

18 Committee is used, nominations shall be permitted from the floor at the meeting held to elect 19 officers.

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21 Section 3.

To be eligible for office, except Trustee, a member must be in good standing for one (1) year immediately preceding the election. To be eligible for election to Trustee, a member must be in

24 good standing for ninety (90) calendar days immediately preceding the election.

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26 Section 4.

Officers shall be elected by secret ballot vote, and the balloting shall be so conducted as to afford all members in good standing a reasonable opportunity to vote. Voting may take place at a designated area/areas and times as determined by the Executive Board prior to the elections. All

designated voting areas will deliver to the presiding president(s), at the time, all ballots and list of

the members in good standing who voted, in a sealed envelope that will be provided by the chapter.

³² Voting will take place within five (5) days of the meeting held for nominations.

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34 Section 5.

Every Officer and Trustee shall, upon assuming office, subscribe to the obligation of an Officer and Trustee, contained in these bylaws.

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38 Section 6.

At the end of each year in office, the President shall receive one hundred fifty dollars (\$150) from the local treasury. In the event of Co-Presidents, the one hundred fifty dollars (\$150) shall be split at seventy-five dollars (\$75) each, and the Vice President, Secretary, Membership Officer and the Treasurer shall receive thirty-seven dollars and fifty cents (\$37.50) each.

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ARTICLE IX DUTIES OF OFFICERS

4 <u>Section 1. President / Co-Presidents.</u>

The President shall preside at all meetings of the organization and of the Executive Board. The President shall supervise all activities of the organization; execute all instruments in its behalf; counter-sign all checks drawn or charges made by debit card against the funds of the organization; appoint all special committees of the organization subject to the approval of the Executive Board; report periodically to the membership regarding the progress and standing of the organization in regard to the president's official acts; perform all other duties as prescribed in the bylaws and perform such other duties inherent in such office.

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13 Section 2. Vice President.

The Vice President shall act for the President in the President's absence and perform such other acts as the president or Executive Board may direct. In the case of permanent disability or resignation of the President, the Vice President, shall succeed to that office for the unexpired portion of the current term of office. The Executive Board may authorize the Vice President, to act as a co-signer of checks drawn or charges made by debit card on the funds of the organization in place of or in addition to either the President or Treasurer.

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21 Section 3. Secretary.

It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep all records of the organization, the Executive Board, and to perform such other acts as the president and Executive Board may direct.

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25 Section 4. Treasurer.

The Treasurer shall receive and be accountable for all funds and moneys belonging to the

- organization; pay all obligations incurred by the organization in payment as authorized by the
- Executive Board; maintain bank accounts and depositories designated by the Executive Board; and
- such money shall be withdrawn only by checks signed by the President and/or Vice President and the Treasurer or debit card when pre-approved by the Executive Board; and shall render periodic
- the Treasurer or debit card when pre-approved by the Executive Board; and shall render periodic financial reports as required by the Executive Board or by the membership; and keep an accurate
- record of receipts and disbursements; and shall act as custodian of all properties of the
- record of receipts and disbursements; and shall act as custodian of all properties of the organization.
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35 Section 5. Membership Officer.

The Membership Officer shall maintain a current and accurate list of members of the chapter in coordination with the membership information section at PSE headquarters; ensure that all

members are paying dues; render periodic reports as required by Public School Employees of

41 Section 6. Sergeant-at-Arms.

The Sergeant-at-Arms is responsible for preserving peace and decorum during meetings held and ensure business is conducted appropriately.

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45 Section 7. Trustee.

- 47 Executive Board the needs, desires, and concerns of the members in their classification. They will
- ⁴⁸ be responsible, along with the Grievance Committee, in advising an employee about their

15	Except to the extent specified in the bylaws, no Officer of this organization shall have the power to		
16	act as agent for, or otherwise bind this organization in any way whatsoever. No member or group of		
17	members or any other person or persons shall have the power to act on behalf of or otherwise bind		
18	the organization except to the extent specifically authorized in writing by the President or		
19	Executive Board of the organization.

22	The latest edition of <u>Robert's Rules of Order</u> shall be the guide in all cases in which they are		
23	applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the constitution, bylaws and special rules of		
24	this organization or of the Public School Employees of Washington / SEIU Local 1948.		
25	Section 4.		
26 27	In order to provide the chapter with the highest quality direction and management possible, the		
27	following operating principles shall guide the Executive Board.		
28 29	To nowing operating principles shall guide the Executive Board.		
29 30	A. Board/Membership Relationships. A positive, constructive, cooperative relationship		
31	between the board and the membership is essential to achieving the mission and vision of		
32	the organization. Therefore, the Board and membership will conduct themselves in a way		
33	that promotes mutual trust, demonstrates respect for individual dignity, and displays		
34	professionalism. The board shall utilize positive conflict resolution methods and maintain		
35	open, honest lines of communication that respect an appropriate chain of command within		
36	the chapter.		

- B. Media. The president, or his / her designee, is the primary spokesperson for the chapter. 38 Media inquiries to individual board members about matters of organization concerns 39 should be referred to the chapter president. Inquiries about the position of PSE on any 40 matter of statewide concern or specific legislation should be referred to the Executive 41 Director at state headquarters. 42

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In the event of a prolonged natural disaster, pandemic, or other "Act of God" which prevents the 45 membership from meeting in person for the purposes of voting for union officers through secret ballot 46 47
